Early Learning and Child Care Council for Oceanside (ELCCO) Submitted by Table Lead Carol O'Connor

ELCCO has held monthly meetings via ZOOM over the last year which have been well attended. Members and liaisons have been very active in support and development of publicly funded childcare.

The Town of Qualicum Beach received funding from UBCM and Province of BC New Spaces grants. We received 2 million dollars to build 37 childcare spaces. ELCCO is named as the 'user group' for the "Into the Woods Childcare" project and has enjoyed tremendous community support from the Oceanside Early Years Childcare community. ELCCO has created an Into the Woods side table which works with the architect, Town planner, construction manager and is developing governance and operational strategies.

School District 69 and Building Learning Together are currently constructing a new childcare center at Arrowview Elementary School and is developing out of school care spaces at Errington Elementary School. They are also partnering with SD69 CUPE union to support the Building Seamless Childcare Initiative.

The City of Parksville is developing a partnership with the Boys and Girls Club and has made application to UBCM and Province of BC New Spaces. These grants will create 91 childcare and out of school childcare spaces.

ELCCO, initiated and has been an active partner in the Mid-Island Collaborative. SPARC BC were hired as the consultants for the collaborative. Through the work of these knowledgeable consultants, the Oceanside community has had many opportunities to recruit community support for a publicly funded universal childcare system.

SPARC BC's report "Mid Island Action Plan", provides our community with evidence of the need for more childcare spaces and makes recommendations that will continue to guide ELCCO in its support of Quality, Accessible and Affordable childcare for Oceanside families.

Communications and Wellness Report

In October 2020, in recognition of the hardships that many residents in care homes faced during the lockdown, our families compiled messages and photographs of gratitude. Social Connections

Social isolation is a significant physical and mental health concern for stay-at-home caregivers, seniors, disabled, singles and others.

Over the last year, as QCEWS Social Connections Table Lead I have participated in the collaboration that is now the Oceanside Seniors Action Group (OSAG). This group is seeking to understand seniors' needs with the key question for residents of Oceanside: "What are you doing/what do you need, to age successfully in the place of your choosing?"

At present OSAG has begun to circulate brochures with this message at selected sites in Bowser, Errington, Red Gap and Meadowood. After COVID-19 has been suppressed OSAG will start community conversations at selected sites which will allow face to face conversations on this question with local residents.

The COVID-19 pandemic has increased awareness of the need for mutual support among neighbours during emergencies. There is an interest in OSAG to organize neighbourhood contact networks possibly in conjunction with existing Block Watch networks. Eventually our social action research outcomes are intended to increase social connection among residents. Through this OSAG effort people living in District 69 will have a better understanding of how social connection affects our residents' mental health and will encourage the organization of mutual support networks among neighbours.
